Podcasts

Objective: Improve students' listening skills in English while promoting critical thinking and communication.

Level: Intermediate to Advanced

Duration: 1-2 class periods (adjustable)

Materials Needed

- Access to a computer or mobile device with internet connectivity
- A selection of relevant podcasts
- A projector or screen (optional)

Teaching Outline
